Campers will be parked with assistance from superintendents and camper host, especially to fit everyone behind cattle barns. Exhibitor camping is only for those who are showing livestock or assisting with care, not for extended family or guests.

Camping rules: no awnings, no dogs, no fires, no patio lights, no air-conditioners, minimum appliances/unplug when not in use; parking after noon on Sunday, through Wednesday before dark and check in before parking

Quiet at night after hours.

No alcohol on Midway, No Fire Arms, No glass containers, NO PETS *of any kind*

The Society will not be responsible for any accident or damage that may occur to persons or property while on any road leading from the street to the Fairgrounds. Neither will the Society be responsible for accidents or damage to persons or property which are upon the Society's grounds. All stock and articles entered for premium must be under the care and control of the owner and at his risk during the Fair.

All premiums are liable to a pro rata reduction, sufficient to meet any deficiency that may occur in the receipts, to meet said premiums and other expenses.

- Pulling-Horses, Ponies and Oxen will be same day entry at the admissions gate.
- Entry forms for Livestock due August 15 with full payment: Dairy Cattle, Oxen and Steers, Horses, Goats, Sheep, Swine, and Poultry.
- Entry forms for Harvest & Garden, Floral Hall and Junior Division due by September 1 for guaranteed acceptance, and name to be in the exhibitor raffle prize drawings.

STOCK

All stock and articles entered for premiums must be owned by the person entering the same, otherwise the premiums will be forfeited to the Society.

Stock withdrawn for the night (at the discretion of superintendent) must be returned by 8 A.M. the following morning, or the place will be forfeited and the stock ruled out for competition. Premiums will not be paid on stock (both open class and junior division) if they are removed from the grounds prior to the close of the fair, except if such removals be by special permit from the Department Superintendent or Secretary.

No payment will be paid for stock of any kind kept or fed off grounds unless accompanied by a written permit from the Superintendent of that department. All stock and produce must be ready to be judged Thursday, September 16, 2021, at 9:00 A.M.

All stock, including cattle and horses, will be shown in a show ring, and exhibitors must be on hand to show their stock. Exhibitors must take prize-winning stock on parade or be subject to forfeit of premium. Exception at the discretion of Department Superintendent.

Horses, oxen, and dairy cattle will be shown in a ring and no person will be allowed in the ring except judges and their helpers and the party attending the animals.

All Exhibitors must furnish own hay. Bedding is provided but limited to 2 bales of shavings.

All Exhibitors must wear wristbands to have admission without problems. If you have a problem, see your superintendent for help. Be polite at ticket booths and in presence of fairgoing public.

JUDGING

No person who is an exhibitor can act as a judge in the class in which he exhibits. During the examination by the judges, if any person interferes with them by letter or otherwise, such person will be excluded from competition. When called upon, exhibitors are expected to give a verbal or written statement concerning their contributions.

When there is no competition, the exhibitors may receive such awards as the judges may determine, but shall not receive premiums unless stock or articles are meritorious.

When animals or articles are not deemed worthy of a premium, the judges shall in all cases reject them and they will adhere strictly to this rule.

Exhibitors of livestock need to be prepared to show registry and health papers.

In examining stock, reference will be made to symmetry, size and docility, and general characteristics of good breeding which not only exhibits the skills of the breeders but greatly enhances the value of the stock produced on the farm.



After the fair: Remember to pick up your items, ribbons and premiums immediately after 6PM Sunday or on Monday morning from 9-11AM. Exhibits are not saved or stored.

- ~No ribbons are mailed afterwards due to prohibitive postage, so only premium checks at the latest by October 31, as a courtesy. Make sure your address is complete and up to date on your entry form.
- **~Premium checks** must be cashed by December 31 or else become VOID, and not re-issued.

OPEN DAIRY SHOW: Department 10

- 1. Both Jr. and Open Exhibitors for cattle should be entered on the same entry blank. Please note that the Junior Cattle entry information follows the Open information. Entry forms are due August 15. Please note the proper dept., class, and breed/section numbers.
- 2. All animals must be owned and registered in the exhibitor's name on or before July 1. Leased animals are allowed (dated prior to August 15) for Junior exhibitors only. Junior Division entrants must enter their animals in the Open Show under the same name as in the Junior Show. Signed leased forms must be available for inspection prior to the show. Junior exhibitor entries may be shown by a farm representative for the Open show, and those animals will be eligible for group classes. A farm or family unit is limited to one entry per group class, and the intention to exhibit as a farm or family unit must be indicated to the Superintendent prior to the show.
- 3. Calves under 4 months of age will not be awarded cash prizes in single classes. Fall Yearling heifers which have freshened will be shown in the two-year old class. An exhibitor may enter more than one animal in single classes, but only one entry in group classes. All animals shown in group classes must have been shown in single classes.
- 4. Health requirements: Dairy Cattle must have an accompanying current Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) with written proof of rabies vaccination. Shipping fever vaccination is strongly recommended. Animals must be free of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases. Multiple animals of the same species from the same location may be listed together on one CVI. Cattle must be identified by a USDA approved eartag.

The CVI, USDA approved eartag, and registration and lease papers, <u>will be checked</u> by the Superintendent upon arrival. Out of state exhibitors please have a CVI plus obtain import permit from the Chief of Livestock, Vermont Agency of Agriculture, Food and Markets, Montpelier, VT. Write for them early .

- 5. All animals must be on the grounds by 8 P.M. Wed. evening of the Fair; early (Tuesday) and late arrivals need to contact the Superintendent. Any animal not meeting health requirements will be removed by the exhibitor at the request of the superintendent and the veterinarian on duty.
- 6. All exhibitors entering Gate 6 to provide feed and supplies must be done and out prior to 8 A.M. All trailers must be parked in allotted parking area in Sherlock's Field (through Gate 8).
- 7. Animals will be released at 6 P.M., Sunday, or at the discretion of the Superintendent. Please do not start loading before that time. Failure to comply with this rule may result in loss of premiums. Exhibitors will be notified about traffic and loading procedures by superintendents.
- 8. Exhibitors must take a representation or group on parade for the Cavalcade of Livestock. Exemptions only at the discretion of the Superintendent.
- 9. Due to limited space, the Superintendent reserves the right to reduce herd sizes, or eliminate late entries. All efforts will be made to accommodate exhibitors.
- 10. Exhibitors will receive wristbands to wear all four days instead of season tickets.

Entries for this department need to be received by August 15th.

Cattle entries for this department are required to stay the duration of the fair, with the exception of 4 - H cattle entering on Sunday for the Jr. / Sr. Steer Driving Contest. Exhibitors are responsible for their own feed, but bedding will be provided. Exhibitors will receive a wrist band and a helper's pass that is to be worn the duration of the fair.

Any exhibitor staying all 4 days in this department can compete in showing and pulling.

All cattle in the barns are required to weigh-in on Wednesday at 6 PM. Teams weigh-in at this time to determine which classes they will be entered into. The scales are located along the race track in front of the grand stand.

Any exhibitors wishing to pull on Saturday will need to weigh cattle again on Saturday morning.

During Friday's Open Show ALL exhibitors will be required to enter their cattle in the Best Working Class. At the conclusion of this class exhibitors can enter their cattle in Best Matched or Best Conditioned, but not to exceed more than two premiums total.

• ALL REGISTERED BREEDS must be able to show proof of registration if requested.

All equines six months of age and over are required by regulation to have a negative coggins test, within the current year, by an approved laboratory. Copy of the negative test must be shown to the superintendent before the horse can be unloaded. Also required is proof of annual rabies shot within current year. The State of Vermont Dept. of Agriculture recommends a vaccination for flu and Rhino within 14 days and 6 months prior to the event.

- Class divisions will be by age, as of January 1st of the current year as follows:
- No child under the age of two may show in any class except for the Stick Horse Class.

Beginner: 12 years old and under; also those 10 to 12 years of age who are in their first year of showing, and never have shown in a cantering class.

Junior: 13 years and under-will show at a walk, trot/jog, canter/lope.

Senior: 14 through 18 years old-will show at a walk, trot/jog, canter/lope.

Adult: 19 years old and over-will show at a walk, trot/jog, canter/lope.

Novice Adult: Rider 19 years or older will show at a walk, trot/jog (cannot enter any class requiring a canter.)

NOVICE HORSE: ADULT RIDER ONLY.

- ASTM certified and SEI approved hard hats are required for all exhibitors under age 18 whenever mounted.
- The equivalent of two (2) bags of sawdust will be provided per stall. If you want more, please bring your own.
- Walk your animals in the horse area. Areas in front of stalls are to be kept clear of vehicles and animals.
- All animals are to be in stalls by 8:00 P.M. Designated responsible persons are to be on the grounds at all times. Halter and lead lines must be available close to the stall doors along with "In case of emergency" stall cards which should be affixed to each stall door.
- Animals will not be released before 6:00 PM Sunday. Please do not load or leave before this time. Failure to comply with this rule may result in loss of premiums.

Problem animals will be dismissed from the Fairgrounds at the discretion of the Superintendent.

There will be scheduled turn out in the ring.

Small classes may be combined and large classes may be divided at the discretion of the judge.



The Tunbridge World's Fair is the first nationally to give an award for the best presentation of rare breeds and overall conservation effort. Qualifying is any breed rated by the Livestock Conservancy as a priority for conservation. The Fair recognizes the importance of how crucial these now-rare breeds were to the early settlers of Vermont and that their genetics are being lost at an alarming rate. Many of these breeds are dual or even triple purpose, a manageable size and temperament for small farms.

It is these rare breeds that still carry the instinctive ability to thrive, reproduce and prosper in a natural environment, unlike some of the "superior" animals of today.

HEALTH STANDARDS FOR VERMONT FAIRS

Note: Animals being imported from outside the state of Vermont must comply with the established rules governing the importation of domestic animals including livestock and poultry. Contact the office of the State Veterinarian at 802-828-2421.

Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI)

All Vermont cattle, sheep, goats, camelids, and swine shall have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection issued by a veterinarian within six months of the event. Such certificate shall include a description of the animal(s) including sex, breed, age, and any form of individual identification. Such certificate shall also state that the described animals have been inspected and show no signs of infectious, contagious, and/or communicable disease. Such certificate shall also document dates of any required vaccinations or health tests.

Vermont equine animals accompanied by a current negative official EIA test record with a complete identification of the horse and a record of a current rabies vaccination will be acceptable in lieu of a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

Rabies Vaccination

All animals for which there is an approved rabies vaccine, including cattle, horses, sheep, dogs, cats and ferrets, shall have a current rabies vaccination according to the manufacturers recommendations. Such vaccination shall be documented either on an individual rabies vaccination certificate or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and shall include the name of the vaccine used, serial number, date administered and its duration. Rabies vaccination of equine can be recorded on an official EIA test record. The vaccination should be administered at least 30 days (and current within the previous 12 months) prior to the event and according to the manufacturers recommendation.

EIA/Coggins for Horses

All equine shall have documentation of a negative test result for Equine Infectious Anemia within 12 months of the event. Such test results shall be documented either on an official EIA test record form or on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection including the date of sampling and the laboratory where the test was run.

Cattle Shipping Fever Vaccination

All cattle shall have a shipping fever vaccination within 6 months but no less than 14 days prior to the event which includes IBR, BVD, PI3, and BRSV. Such vaccination shall be documented on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and shall include the date administered and the trade name of the vaccine.

Summary of Requirements by Species FOUINF

- Official EIA test record with negative EIA results within 12 months, or a Certificate of Vet Inspection (CVI) with a record of EIA test results, laboratory and date of sampling.
- Current rabies vaccination according to manufacturers recommendation > 30 days
- Vaccination for Flu and Rhino between 14 days and 6 months is recommended.
- *Out-of-State equine imported into Vermont are required to have CVI issued within 30 days prior to entry, or a CVI issued for the 6 month duration of an exhibition permit.
- Call 802-828-2421 for an exhibition permit.

SHEEP, GOATS, CAMELIDS AND SWINE

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) within 6 months
- Rabies vaccination between 30 days and 12 months for animals over 3 months of age
- *Out-of-State sheep, goats and swine imported into Vermont are required to have official individual identification and an import permit with a CVI issued within 30 days prior to entry, or a CVI issued for the 6 month duration of an exhibition permit. Call 802-828-2421.
- •*Out-of-State camelids imported into Vermont are required to have an import permit, a negative brucellosis test within 30 days and a negative TB test within 90 days. With an exhibition permit, Brucellosis and TB tests will be acceptable for the 6 month duration of the exhibition permit. Acceptable identification of camelids will be detailed description of the animal, a photograph signed and dated on the back by an accredited vet, or any other artificial means of ID. Call 802-828-2421 for a permit.
- As of 2008: all sheep and goats are required to have on official scrapie tag (or official tattoo if goat breed is ear-less). Free tags and free tag applicators for your farm are available at 1-866-USDATAG

POULTRY

- All domestic fowl shall have a certificate of health from a state livestock official which shall document that the fowl have been tested and found negative for pullorum-typhoid disease or originate from a pullorum-typhoid clean or passed flock, tested within the past 12 months.
- All poultry must arrive between noon-6pm Weds. before fair opens for state vet inspection.
- No rabbits or fowl under eight weeks of age in lots of less than six may be offered for sale, or sold, displayed or given away.

CATTLE

- Certificate of Vet Inspection (CVI) issued within 6 months of the event
- Current rabies vaccination according to manufacturers recommendation between 30 days and 12 months for animals over 3 months of age.
- Shipping fever vaccination between 14 days and 6 months prior to the event
- Out of State cattle imported into Vermont also require official individual identification and an import permit with a CVI dated within 30 days of entry, or a CVI issued for the six month duration of an exhibition permit. Call 802-828-2421 for a permit.

No animals may be sold during fair time. No animal may be used as a fund-raising device or award unless recognized by an agricultural or sporting association. Animals may not be transferred without reasonable assurance from the person receiving it, that the animal will have proper transportation and adequate care.

Notice: All horses and ponies temporarily imported into Vermont for purposes of participating in any pulling event, farm horse competition, exhibit or any other competition must be accompanied by the following:

~A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI - commonly called a health chart) including the complete description of the horse and completed and signed within 30 days of the import by a veterinarian licensed and accredited in the state of origin; or a CVI dated within 6 months (180 days) of importation accompanied by an exhibition permit, obtained from the Vermont Agency of Agriculture. To obtain an exhibition permit, contact the Agency's animal health office 802-828-2421.

~A valid negative EIA test record (negative Coggins test), containing a complete description of the horse and completed and signed by a veterinarian; icensed and accredited with the state of origin. This negative test record must be dated within 12 months of entry into Vermont and is required for all horses 6 months of age or older and for any weanling traveling without dam, regardless of age.

Any owner, competitor or handler in possession of a horse or pony at a Vermont pulling event or other competition or exhibit without the required CVI, exhibition permit where applicable, and a negative Coggins test chart is subject to immediate dismissal from the grounds and from the State by the Vermont State Veterinarian or his or her designee.

- d. Clean, and if necessary, properly trim exhibits. Specimens should be free from soil, as well as any other foreign matter, such as polishing agents. Avoid skinning and bruising specimens when cleaning them.
- e. Follow the premium list so that the correct number of specimens will be selected for display.



- 2. To make the cupcakes: Beat together the oil, sugar, salt, eggs, and spices.
- 3. Mix the flour with the baking soda, and stir in.
- 4. Add the carrots and nuts, and mix until just blended. Pour into the prepared pans.
- 5. Bake the cupcakes for 21 to 24 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted into the center of one of the middle cupcakes comes out clean. Remove the cakes from the oven, and after about 10 minutes transfer them to a rack to cool. Allow them to cool completely before frosting.
- 6. To make the frosting: Beat the butter and cream cheese together until smooth.
- 7. Beat in the salt and vanilla, then the sugar. Add a teaspoon of milk or cream if the frosting is too stiff to spread; add additional sugar if it's too thin.
- 8. Frost the cupcakes, using a piping bag and tip for an elegant presentation.



Basic Muffins (with berry and oatmeal versions)

This recipe is a taking-off point; use it to create your own favorite muffins by adding fruits and flavorings, nuts and vegetables, or substituting various grains. Muffins, being so easy and quick to make, are wonderful for experimenting. For instant gratification, of both the taste buds and the creative spirit, nothing beats a muffin!

Prep 10 mins Bake 15 to 20 mins Total 30 mins Yield 24 mini or 12 standard **Ingredients**

- 2 cups (212g) pastry flour or 2 cups (240g) King Arthur Unbleached All-Purpose Flour*
- 1/2 cup (100g) granulated sugar 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 tablespoon (14g) baking powder
- 1 cup (227g) milk 1/4 cup (50g) vegetable oil or 4 tablespoons (57g) melted butter (optional)*
- 2 large eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract, optional sparkling white sugar, optional; for topping *See "tips," below Instructions
- 1. Preheat your oven to 425°F. Lightly grease the cups of a standard 12-cup muffin pan. Or line the cups with papers, and grease the papers.
- 2. Blend together the dry ingredients.
- 3. Beat the liquid ingredients together milk, oil or butter, eggs, and vanilla until light.
- 4. Pour the wet ingredients into the dry ingredients. Take a fork or wire whisk and blend the two briefly about 20 seconds should do it. The secret to light and tender muffins lies in blending together the liquid and dry ingredients gently. It's OK to leave some lumps that look as if they want more stirring; they really don't. So, no matter how hard it is, resist the impulse.
- 5. Fill the cups of the muffin pan two-thirds to three-quarters full. Sprinkle with sparkling white sugar, if desired.
- 6. Bake the muffins for 15 to 20 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted into the middle of one of the center muffins comes out clean. Remove them from the oven, and as soon as you can handle them turn them out of the pan onto a rack to cool.

Tips from our Bakers

If you leave the oil out, you can reduce the calories in your muffins by about 30%; the flavor will still be excellent, but muffins won't be quite as tender, and won't keep as well should you happen to have any left over. • To make oatmeal muffins: If you like the old-fashioned taste of oats, you'll love this easy variation. Instead of using 2 cups of flour, use 1 cup rolled oats and 1 1/4 cups flour. If you like a heartier muffin, substitute brown sugar for granulated. These muffins don't rise as high as the basic muffins, but they certainly taste wonderful! • To make berry or fruit muffins: Add 1 1/2 cups of berries to the recipe (or finely chopped, well-drained fresh fruit: peaches, apples, etc.; or chopped dried fruit; or Jammy Bits, sweet, soft little morsels of fruit purée). To make sure berries or fruit stay evenly distributed throughout the batter, add to the dry ingredients and mix until coated before adding the liquid ingredients. This prevents them from sinking once the liquids are blended in.
