

DEPARTMENTS 90, 94 & 96 – POULTRY & RABBITS

- All domestic fowl shall have a certificate of health from a state livestock official which shall document that the fowl have been tested and found negative for Pullorum-typhoid disease or originate from a pullorum-typhoid clean or passed flock, tested within the past 12 months.
- All poultry must arrive between 1pm-5pm Wednesday before the fair opens for state health inspection and testing.
- An Animal Health Specialist from the Vermont Agency of Agriculture, Food and Markets will be available on Wednesday between 1pm-5pm to test poultry.
- All fowl must be free of visual evidence of avian influenza, infectious bronchitis, coryza, Pullorum-typhoid, fowl-pox, external parasites and laryngotracheitis.
- No rabbits or fowl under eight weeks of age in lots of less than six may be offered for sale, or sold, displayed, or given away.
- Due to the ongoing threat of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI), we are not accepting waterfowl entries in 2023.
